Children with the following challenges often benefit from:

Physical Therapy

- Decreased balance and coordination
- Decreased motor skills, such as rolling, walking, sitting and jumping
- Proper use of prosthetics/orthotics
- Decreased muscle control, range of motion, strength and endurance
- Equipment needs for standing and mobility

Occupational Therapy

- Difficulty with coloring, cutting or handwriting skills
- Decreased fine motor skills, such as buttoning or zipping
- Difficulty with self-feeding
- Decreased sensory integration

Speech Therapy

- Decreased verbal and non-verbal communication skills
- Pronunciation errors
- Receptive and expressive language difficulties
- Auditory processing deficits
- Difficulty with word and letter formation
- Impaired oral motor skills for speech and eating
- Swallowing difficulties
- Voice disorders
- Use of augmentative and assisted technology
