



nderson Regional Medical Center is now a back-to-back recipient of the American College of Cardiology's NCDR Chest Pain MI Registry Platinum Performance Achievement Award, having received the award in both 2019 and 2020. Anderson is one of only 140 hospitals nationwide to receive the honor this year.

The award recognizes Anderson's success in implementing a higher standard of care for heart attack patients by meeting aggressive performance measures as outlined by the American College of Cardiology and the American Heart Association clinical guidelines and recommendations.

"The cardiac team at Anderson continues to set and achieve high goals that improve the outcomes of our heart attack patients and in turn, save lives. This award demonstrates that our physicians and staff have a strong commitment to provide patients with the most advanced cardiac care in this area," said John G. Anderson, President and CEO of Anderson Regional Health System.

To receive the Platinum Performance Achievement Award, the hospital must consistently treat heart attack patients according to the most current, science-based guidelines for eight consecutive quarters and meet a performance standard of 90 percent or more for specific performance measures.

"As a Platinum Performance Award recipient, Anderson Regional Medical Center has established itself as a leader in setting the national standard for improving quality of care in patients with acute myocardial infarction," said Michael C. Kontos, MD, FACC, chair of the NCDR Chest Pain – MI

Registry Steering Subcommittee, Virginia Commonwealth University Medical Center. "By meeting the award requirements set forth in the registry, the Anderson team has demonstrated their ability to provide reliable, comprehensive treatment for heart attack patients based on current clinical guideline recommendations."

Dr. Wes Bennett, interventional cardiologist with Cardiovascular Institute of the South, said, "A heart attack occurs when a blood clot in a coronary artery partially or completely blocks blood flow to the heart muscle. Treatment guidelines that are used as performance measures for the award include administering aspirin upon arrival and discharge, timely restoration of blood flow to the blocked artery, smoking cessation counseling and cardiac rehabilitation, among others."

When asked how this award complements Anderson's chest pain center accreditation, Bennett replied, "The Anderson cardiac team uses an evidence-based, protocol-driven, and structured approach to acute care cardiology which allows clinicians to quickly and efficiently assess patients who require timely treatment. Adequate implementation of these processes allows patients to be better monitored, ensuring they are not sent home too early or admitted unnecessarily."

Voluntarily participating in the American College of Cardiology Chest Pain- MI Registry empowers health care provider teams to consistently treat heart attack patients according to the most current, science-based guidelines and establishes a national standard for understanding and improving the quality, safety and outcomes of care provided for patients with coronary artery disease, specifically high-risk heart attack patients.

# UV Robot Expands Sanitization Practices at Anderson

nderson Regional Health System is utilizing UV light emitting robots to provide enhanced sanitization across its facilities. Studies show that UV (Ultraviolet) energy is proven to kill bacteria, fungi and viruses, including 99.999 percent of coronaviruses.

Jason Cain, RN, MSN, Director of Nursing at Anderson Regional Medical Center, said, "The robot is enhancing our infection control procedures with faster, more effective disinfection. For example, it typically takes 45 minutes to effectively clean a patient room manually with disinfectant wipes, and then another 30 to 60 minutes for the chemicals to dry and airborne germs to dissipate. The UVC energy emitted by the robot kills the germs in 15-20 minutes after a thorough manual cleaning, greatly decreasing the wait when a new patient needs to be admitted to the room. Most important, the utilization of a robot decreases the exposure risk for our environmental services team members."

UVC energy is a wavelength range of Ultraviolet energy spanning 200-280 nanometers (nm). The UVC

Robot specifically employs the highly germicidal 253.7 nm bandwidth to cause photochemical damage to cellular DNA and virus RNA. This biological damage inactivates the cell by preventing replication and therefore infection capability. Germicidal efficacy is determined by the overall dose of UVC, which is a product of lamp output (i.e., intensity) and exposure duration. Through effective, single-cycle, whole-room disinfections, the robot delivers the correct dose of UVC energy, ensuring maximum automated germicidal treatment with every cycle.

Dr. Keith Everett, Chief Medical Officer at Anderson Regional Health System, said, "Infection prevention has always been and will always be a priority in our hospitals. Sanitizing our facilities is not a new practice, but the potency of the COVID-19 virus requires us to enhance our sanitizing routines and ensure our processes are at a maximum. The UVC robot technology is capable of removing any potential contamination in just minutes, which allows us to maximize safety and efficiency for our patients and staff."

# Wright Honored With Anderson's First DAISY Award

cottish minister and scholar Robert Leighton wrote, "The flower that follows the sun does so even on cloudy days." Filling one of the most vital roles in the health care system, nurses are often unsung heroes, the flower on that cloudy day for a COVID-19 patient.

Anderson Regional Health System celebrated one such hero when it presented Melissa Wright with The DAISY Award. DAISY is an acronym for Diseases Attacking the Immune SYstem.

The DAISY Foundation was formed in 1999 by the family of Patrick Barnes as a way to honor the

nurses who provided quality and compassionate care to Patrick during the final stages of his battle with Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura (ITP). This award recognizes a markable individual who consistently demonstrates excell-

ence in his or her work. The Barnes family acknowledges the super-human work nurses do for their patients and their families every day.

Wright has been a critical care nurse with Anderson for 15 years; she has been caring for COVID-19 patients in the CCU since the pandemic began.

A resident of York, AL, Wright said she is humbled by this tribute, but more important, she said it is an honor for which she was nominated by one of her patients.

"This nomination was especially meaningful to me," Wright said. "He was in the hospital for a little over a month, but he was on a ventilator for three weeks of that time. He recovered, so he is one of our success stories."

Day in, day out, nurses who care for COVID-19 patients become the primary communicator between patients and their family members.

"We are so close with these patients; they become just as important as our family members," Wright said. "That's what makes our care for them so special and important."

Nurses in the CCU do everything from assisting in FaceTime calls between patients and their loved ones, to talking to the patient every day and reassuring them with kind words.

Wright was presented with a certificate, a DAISY Award pin, and a hand-carved stone sculpture entitled "The Healer's Touch." Additionally, everyone in the unit celebrated with cinnamon rolls

> made with Makara cinnamon, a favorite of Patrick's during his illness. The Barnes Family asked that whenever and wherever nurses smell cinnamon aroma, they stop and think about how special they are.

Melia Goodman, director of Critical


Care, said Wright was the perfect choice for this award.

"[Wright] is a great leader," Goodman said. "She does what it takes, and she never complains. COVID takes a toll on all us, our patients, their families, and our nurses."

Wright is so appreciative of her DAISY that she will continue to fight the battle against COVID-19, just like all of her fellow nurses in the CCU, she said.

Come December, Wright and her fiancé, Thad Cobb, will marry, a ceremony they postponed in April due to the pandemic.

"We will go to the mountains and marry, then we will have a big celebration when this virus is long gone," Wright said.

# MCC Nursing Students Garner 11 Anderson Scholarships

Por Oregon native Angela Bautista, her decision to become a nurse wasn't as innate for her as it is for others.

"No one in my family is a nurse, and most of the time, when I met a nurse at a doctor's office, I didn't even know they were one," she noted.

But it was a bank co-worker who recognized Bautista's potential nursing skills and encouraged her to pursue a career in this healthcare field.

Today, the 26-year-old Meridian resident is a third semester Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) Program student at Meridian Community College, one of 11 students selected for seven Anderson Regional Health System scholarships. Each comes with a \$2,500 honorarium.

For the past 32 years, Anderson has provided scholarships to MCC nursing students. John Anderson, President and CEO of Anderson Regional Health System, said, "The scholarships are mutually beneficial for Anderson and MCC. Our relationship with MCC remains a valued recruitment pipeline for our nursing work force, which is the core service of our health care system. We are honored to present these scholarships that help future nurses advance their education," he said.

"We're so grateful to Anderson for providing scholarships to our nursing students. These dollars help open doors to outstanding students who will, in turn, give back to the healthcare needs of our community," said MCC President Dr. Thomas Huebner.

Nurses follow a calling and often show characteristics of being tenacious, compassionate and driven; the Anderson scholarship recipients are nursing students who demonstrate those qualities. They are selected based on academic ability, nursing excellence, MCC faculty's recommendation, an application and a written essay on why they chose nursing as a career.

Dr. Lara Collum, MCC associate vice president of nursing and healthcare education said nursing education is critical for helping future nurses develop the reasoning and judgement skills to safely practice as a nurse. "Part of our program mission at MCC is to prepare students for safe, effective professional practice that enhances our local and global communities."

Dr. Huebner added, "We appreciate the life-changing opportunities afforded by this investment."

The partnership between Anderson and MCC is longstanding, said Leia Hill, vice president of institutional advancement and executive director of the MCC Foundation. "The support we receive from Anderson has been significant for our students, MCC, and our community," she said.

Hill added, "We appreciate working with colleagues who have a vision for investing in the health-related educational needs of Meridian and Lauderdale County and are proud of the students who have earned these

scholarships."

Bautista, who holds a bachelor of science degree in speech communications from Oregon State University, said she's now discovered a passion for nursing. "When I envision myself in the future as a nurse, it makes me so happy and excited for what lies ahead," she noted.

Another MCC third-semester student and scholarship recipient,



Michelle Smith, 49, from Buckatunna, said her dream of nursing started in high school. Still, she changed career paths and didn't pursue nursing until

after her children were grown. Starting as a certified nurse assistant, "I worked as an aide at a long-term health facility for six months to see if this was really what I wanted to do. I fell in love with every aspect of my job and I knew I had to see this dream to the end," she said.

patients and was staffed by three physicians and a handful of nurses. Dr. Anderson's vision for the future, and his commitment to providing quality medical care for the residents in East Central Mississippi and West Central Alabama are the foundation

of what has now grown to be Anderson Regional Health System, a 400-bed medical center with over 160 physicians representing more than 38 specialties. The scholarship was created in 2004 to honor Dr. Anderson.

### Burgers from the Board




