

## Cuddle Cots Give Grieving Families a Bit More Time

Newton County mother has used her grief over losing a baby to help others. On June 15, 2020, Heather Ferguson gave birth to a son, baby Grant, who survived only a few hours due to a kidney disorder. To honor the first year of his birth, Heather came up with an idea for a fundraiser for Cuddle Cots. This unique device cools a deceased baby's body, allowing the family to spend a little more time to take pictures, and make hand prints and foot prints.



"There is a group on Facebook that I follow that has other mothers that had children that passed away," said Heather. "I wanted to do something for Grant this year for his birthday, so I decided to look into purchasing a cuddle cot. I started a fundraiser on Facebook and it blew up. People started donating — parents, grandparents, sisters — because everybody has someone they know that has lost a child." Heather has raised almost \$3,500 in only a month, and she hopes to continue her efforts.

The family of one of Makayla's patients wrote her nomination, which read: "My mother was in CCU with COVID at the beginning of January. During one of the scariest times in our family life, Makayla made it easier. She was so compassionate with Mom and reassured us every time we called to check in. Makayla cared for Mom as a person, not just a patient in a bed. She realized Mom needed interaction and she put herself at risk to make that happen. She was a joy to talk to and her kind spirit was evident in how she cared for Mom and our family. Makayla went above and beyond to make sure my Mom was reassured of healing possibilities — so much so that Mom's facial expression and demeanor were different on days that Makayla was her nurse. Mom is moving her left arm and both legs now and is no longer on a trach. She mouths words and squeezes our hands to say yes and no. She has smiled when we laugh, and she puckers her lips to give us kisses when we lean down to her. She even squeezes us between her head and shoulder when we hug her. Mom has a lot of life left. Anderson, through nurses like Makayla, gave that to her. We are forever thankful. Makayla set the bar high, and we pray blessings upon blessings on her, her family and Anderson. Thank you all, but most of all, thank you a million times, Makayla! We love you forever!"



August Crystal Watkins, RN

Crystal Watkins, Registered Nurse, works on 4 East and was recognized as our DAISY award recipient for the month of August. One of Crystal's patients wrote her nomination which read: "Two months ago, despite increasing pain in my back and trouble breathing, I was living my normal life. About 4-5 weeks ago, the pain in my back became so intense that I called 911 and was taken to the hospital. My diagnosis was stunning and shocking: Stage IV lung cancer metastasized to my spine. Dr. John Voss recommended two weeks of daily radiation to prevent paralysis and reduce pain. Unfortunately, the paralysis from the thigh down occurred anyway, but there was some reduction of pain temporarily. It was there in the 4-East Wing of Anderson Regional Medical Center that I found myself blessed to be under the compassionate and kind care of Nurse Crystal Watkins. Her professional perfectionism and patient manner soothed me and never failed to calm my highest levels of agitation and anxiety. Whenever Crystal entered with her sweet smile, my spirit heightened and I knew things were going to be better. I always trusted her to take care of me. I thank God that I was put under the care of Crystal during the most difficult time of my life. She more than deserves the DAISY Award for her compassionate care."


