



nderson Regional Health System has been assisting elderly patients that have been facing symptoms of depression, loneliness, and even suicidal thoughts for ten years with their Senior Behavioral Care.

"This program has provided a safe haven for seniors in Meridian and the surrounding cities. We've been here basically through their own personal storms helping them through the horizon," said Sadé Rogers, MSN, RN, PMHNP, Program Director, and Nurse Manager.

Rogers has committed many years to this program for seniors to help them overcome their mental and emotional obstacles. She said she has a personal passion when it comes to taking care of senior citizens.

"I feel so blessed to be part of this program. Geri-Psych is my favorite population to care for. I always wanted to be a nurse — I wanted to help. I have seen the struggles of what the aging process can do for my own family," said Rogers.

Rogers shares some signs that your loved one may be experiencing some behavioral health problems. "You may notice that your loved one is up all night, maybe a little bit more forgetful and forgetfulness is causing some irritability. Maybe your senior is anxious, having crying spells, or frequently nervous," said Rogers.

"I'm proud to be a part of Horizons Geri-Psych Center to help those families and those individuals who may not understand what's going on and they just need a little help right now," said Rogers.

Clarkdale Students Take on Roles for Drill

Students from Clarkdale High School's health science program took on roles of accident victims during a recent emergency preparedness drill at Anderson Regional Medical Center. The drill was part of an annual training initiative to make sure Anderson's Emergency Department is prepared in case a mass casualty event happens in the community. The Mississippi Department of Health conducted the drill in conjunction with the hospital and the Lauderdale County School District.

"In a mass-casualty situation, the Emergency Department can receive a large number of patients at the same time. This requires staff members from across the hospital to respond to the code and assist the ED staff in quickly identifying the needs of each patient," said Dr. Keith Everett, Chief Medical Officer of Anderson Regional Health System.

The participating Clarkdale students were all members

of the school's health sciences program or HOSA Club. They were each given a scenario to play of a patient in a mass casualty situation that converges on the Emergency Department at once. All of the students were triaged by Anderson Emergency Department physicians and staff. Some were transferred to the Radiology department as a second part of the drill.

"Using drills to practice these skills ensures that we are able to work together as one to efficiently provide life-saving care," Dr. Everett said. Seeing how the Emergency Department staff responds to mass casualties is also beneficial to the students, many of them who are considering careers in the healthcare field, hospital officials said.

Dr. Everett said Anderson staff responded to the drill just like they have been trained to do. "Our staff demonstrated a high level of knowledge, skill and preparedness should an event like this occur in real time."

Zero Tolerance Policy

nderson Regional Health System has a "Zero Tolerance" policy toward all expressions of violence. This Zero Tolerance policy promotes a safe and nonviolent environment for employees, patients and visitors that ensures both physical and psychological safety. Anderson is committed to maintaining a work environment free from acts or threats of violence, including harassment, intimidation, coercion and other disruptive behavior.

To assist in this effort, Anderson has an interdisciplinary Workplace Violence Prevention Team that meets monthly, and as needed, to discuss any new, ongoing, or potential issues related to workplace violence.

Some of the key principles include:

- Victims of workplace violence and those who report workplace violence, will face no retaliation by Anderson, and
- All employees are encouraged to take an active role in creating a safe working environment, and
- Incidents are reported through our incident reporting system and in the Workplace Violence binder located on each unit.
