Anderson Expands Heart Surgery Program with Three Cardiothoracic Surgeons

Dr. Adam Protos, Dr. Ashok Kumar Coimbatore Jeyakumar and Dr. Athanasios Tsiouris bring surgical expertise in comprehensive care for heart disease at any stage, from minimally invasive cardiac surgeries

to complex heart valve replacements.

As a five-time recipient of the American College of Cardiology's Platinum

Performance Achievement Award outstanding heart attack care, ARHS places great emphasis on providing a comprehensive cardiac program for residents of East Mississippi and West Alabama. John G. Anderson, ARHS President and CEO, said, "Anderson has remained the region's leader in cardiac care for decades, and this expansion is an example of our ongoing commitment to offer advanced care at the local level. Drs. Protos, Jeyakumar and Tsiouris are expertly trained surgeons with numerous accolades and accomplishments. We are very pleased that they are providing our patients with highly skilled care for complex conditions."



Dr. Ashok Coimbatore Jeyakumar (Dr. CJ) is the Surgical Director for Advanced Coronary Revascularization & Complex Thoracic Aortic Surgeries in

the Department of Surgery at UMMC. He finished his board residency in Cardiovascular and Thoracic Surgery at the Sree Chitra Tirunal Institute for Medical Sciences and Technology in India. Dr. CJ completed an Advanced Adult Cardiac Surgery Fellowship and a Trans-Catheter Aortic Valve Replacement Fellowship at Emory University Hospital in Georgia. He also completed a Robotic & Minimally Invasive Cardiac Surgery Fellowship at the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio.



Dr. Adam N. Protos is a Division Chief and Assistant Professor in the School of Medicine, Department of Surgery/Cardiothoracic at UMMC. He served as

Medical Director of the Chicago Medical School before his residency in Categorial Surgery from Michigan State University and

> received his Fellow, Department of Cardiothoracic Surgery, from the University of Louisville in 2017. He is a member of

the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, Board Certified in Thoracic Surgery.



Dr. Athanasios Tsiouris is an Assistant Professor and Attending Surgeon in the Division of Cardiac Surgery at UMMC. He received his medical degree from the University of Thessaly in

Greece. He then moved to the United States where he completed a residency in General Surgery at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit, and a residency in Cardiothoracic Surgery at Yale University School of Medicine. Dr. Tsiouris completed a fellowship in Heart, Lung Transplantation and Mechanical Circulatory Support at the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio. Dr. Tsiouris is Board Certified in General Surgery and Thoracic Surgery.

Protos, Jeyakumar and Tsiouris are working alongside nurse practitioner Sondra Odom at Anderson Cardiac Surgical Associates to provide surgical patients with pre- and post-operative care.

Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Program

Anderson Regional Health System's cardiovascular/pulmonary rehabilitation program has been recertified by the American Association of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation (AACVPR).

Regina Haralson, RN, Nurse Manager of Anderson Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Program, said, "As a certified program, we are recognized as leaders in the field of cardiovascular and pulmonary rehabilitation because we offer the most advanced practices available. We are proud to receive recognition for our commitment to improving our patients' quality of life."

The cardiac rehabilitation program is led by Interventional Cardiologist Dr. Michael Purvis. As the Medical Director, Dr. Purvis works closely with the staff to design individualized fitness programs for patients who have experienced a cardiovascular event such as a heart attack or coronary artery bypass graft surgery. In a similar fashion, Dr. Ed Holmes, Pulmonologist, serves as the Medical Director for pulmonary rehabilitation and oversees the development of personalized programs for patients who have respiratory conditions such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Both cardiac and

pulmonary rehabilitation programs include exercise, education, counseling, and support for patients and their families.

To earn accreditation, Anderson Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Program participated in an application process that requires extensive documentation of the program's practices. AACVPR Program Certification is the only peer-review accreditation process designed to review individual programs for adherence to standards and guidelines developed and published by AACVPR and other related professional societies. Each program's application is reviewed by the AACVPR Program Certification Committee, and certification is awarded by the AACVPR Board of Directors.

John G. Anderson, President and CEO of Anderson, said, "We recognized the need for a cardiopulmonary rehab program back in 1989, and Anderson has continued to serve as the area's only accredited facility that offers patients a safe and closely monitored transition to an active lifestyle. We are very proud of the staff for voluntarily submitting themselves to the rigorous certification process and applaud them for the outstanding work they do each and every day."

Anderson Awards Nursing Scholarships

achel McCollough is driven to help others, and that passion for caring has led her to where she is today as a student in Meridian Community College's Associate Degree Nursing Program.

McCollough, 41, of Waynesboro, is a third-semester ADN student and was one of seven MCC nursing students who received Anderson Regional Health System scholarships. The scholarships are \$2,500 each.

For 35 years, ADN students at the College have benefited from scholarships from the Meridian-based health care system. Recipients are full-time students who post grade B or better in nursing courses and have a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. Faculty evaluations and personal essays are also used in the selection process.

At a luncheon honoring the students and guests, John Anderson, President and CEO of Anderson Regional Health System, said the College is a long-standing valued partner with the health system. MCC President Dr. Tom Huebner acknowledged the College's appreciation and thanked the health system and the individuals for whom

the scholarships are named. "These people invested their lives and livelihoods in something they strongly believed, and we get to be the recipients of that. What an honor that is," he said.

MCC Associate Vice President of Nursing and Health Care Education Dr. Lara Collum said the scholarships are impactful. "Your investment in these students makes a difference," she told the health system officials.

Though she began her college studies in the MCC Emergency Medical Technician and Paramedic programs, McCollough aspires to work in critical care nursing. "It's the thing I love the most," she said.

McCollough is the recipient of the Dr. Jeff Hollingsworth Scholarship. Dr. Hollingsworth, the grandson of Dr. Jeff Anderson, was a cardiovascular surgeon in Jackson and was instrumental in getting the Cardiac Catheterization program started in Meridian. Dr. Hollingsworth passed away in 1986. This scholarship was established in 1988 to honor Dr. Hollingsworth.

Robin Garner, 37, of Jackson, received the Dr. Jeff Anderson Scholarship. Dr. Jeff Anderson founded

Anderson Infirmary in 1928. At that time, the hospital had room to accommodate 30 patients and was staffed by three physicians and a handful of nurses. Dr. Anderson's vision for the future and his commitment to providing quality medical care for the residents in East Central Mississippi and West Central Alabama are the foundation of what has now grown to be Anderson Regional Health System, a 400-bed medical center with over 160 physicians representing more than 38 specialties. The scholarship was created in 2004 to honor Dr. Anderson.

Marquita Brewster, 39, of Meridian, was awarded the Dr. W. J. Anderson III Scholarship. Dr. Anderson was the son of Dr. William J. Anderson and the grandson of hospital founder Dr. Jeff Anderson. Dr. Anderson was a general surgeon from 1962 until his retirement in 1998. Dr. Anderson served as president and chairman of the board of directors at Jeff Anderson Regional Medical Center until his death in October 2002. This scholarship was created in 2003 to honor Dr. Anderson's visionary leadership in the hospital.

Tiara Powe, 25, of Meridian, received the Reuben S. Johnson Memorial Scholarship. Johnson began his 47-year service at Anderson Regional Medical Center in 1947. He was president and chairman of the board for 38 years. He was instrumental in the successful transformation of the hospital from a small infirmary to what became Anderson Regional Medical Center. Johnson also served as the internal management consultant from 1976 until he died

in 1994. The scholarship was created in 2007 to honor Johnson's many accomplishments.

Receiving the Dr. William J. Anderson Jr. Scholarships was Letasha Naylor, 32, of Meridian. Dr. Anderson was the son of Dr. Jeff Anderson, the founder of the hospital. Dr. Anderson served as a general surgeon at Jeff Anderson Regional Medical Center. The scholarship was created in 1988, a year after his passing, to honor the many accomplishments of Dr. Anderson.

Amber Fant, 20, of Meridian, received the William J. Gunn, Esquire, Scholarship. Gunn began his service at the medical center in 1965 as secretary to the board of directors and general counsel for the hospital. In 1967, he became a board of directors member and continued his faithful service until his death in August 2001. The scholarship was created in 2002 to honor Gunn's service to the hospital.

Ashley Hollman, 39, of Laurel, was the Anderson Board of Directors Scholarship recipient. The board works behind the scenes to ensure that Dr. Jeff Anderson's vision to give quality health care to the people of our region is carried out. Each member brings expertise in a different area that enhances the quality of care given to patients. These individuals work tirelessly and with very little recognition for their labor. The scholarship was created in 2012 to recognize the valuable contributions of each board member.








Special Sessions for Nurse Residents

The training was hosted by the Mississippi Coalition Against Sexual Assault (MSCASA) Center, in partnership with The Mississippi Crime Lab, Mississippi Child Advocacy Centers, and the Mississippi State Department of Health. The intense weeklong training was taught by Mrs. Shalotta Sharp, RN, SANE-A, SANE-P, Special Projects Coordinator of MSCASA (center of picture) and covered: Overview of Forensic Nursing, Female/Male Anatomy-Physiology, SANE Exam Techniques, Blunt and Sharp Trauma, Strangulation, Drug Facilitated Sexual



Assault, Forensic Photography, Crisis Intervention/Trauma Informed Care, Psychological Response to Sexual Assault, Neurobiology of Sexual Assault, Cultural Diversity/Special Populations, Human Trafficking,

Advocacy Role, Department of Human Services Role, Law Enforcement Role, Forensic Interview/Evidence Collection Techniques, Victims Compensation, STI/EC Medications, Documentation, Discharge Planning, Perpetrator Behavior, and the Mississippi Crime Lab's role. Paula Broome, JD, Training Director of Mississippi Child Advocacy Centers, provided training on the Mississippi law standards and testimony procedures. All nurses were allowed to participate in a mock sexual assault trial, serving as a SANE expert for the prosecutor or defense. The trained SANE nurses are now working towards accumulating 300 hours of sexual assault clinical practice, a criterion that must be met to sit for the certification exam.
