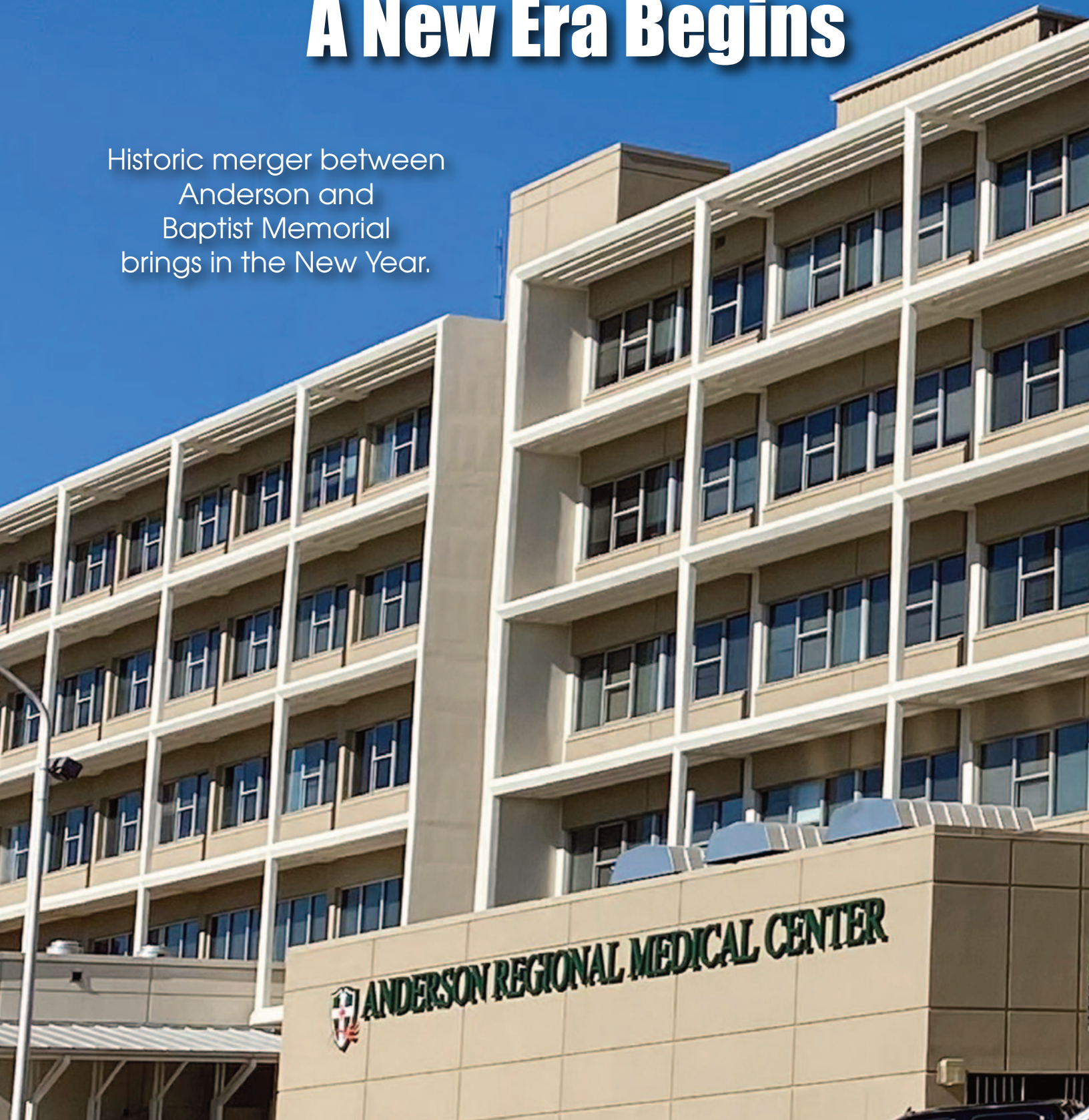

## Baptist Memorial and Anderson Sign Shared Mission Agreement

Anderson Regional Health System and Baptist Memorial Health Care (headquartered in Memphis, TN) have signed a shared mission agreement with plans to formally merge in January 2024.

Baptist Memorial is a not-for-profit health system that operates 22 hospitals across West Tennessee, Mississippi and East Arkansas. It is the largest health system in Mississippi and the state's fourth largest employer.

"We are excited to join forces with Anderson to extend our faith-based mission to this part of Mississippi," said Jason Little, president and CEO of Baptist Memorial Health Care. "Both organizations are proud of the exceptional care we provide. ARHS has a proven track record of success in this region, and we're very experienced in delivering care in all types of Mississippi communities. Together, we have more than two centuries of combined health care experience, and we want to use this knowledge and expertise to bring a new level of care to this community."

Baptist Memorial and Anderson share a similar foundation, with each having a long-standing history of community-based health care and a strong

reputation for high-quality care. Baptist Memorial started in 1912 with one hospital in downtown Memphis, and it is now one of the nation's largest not-for-profit health systems. Anderson first opened in 1928 as a 30-bed infirmary and is now a comprehensive regional health system serving East Mississippi and West Alabama. With this partnership, Baptist Memorial will serve more than half of Mississippi's population.

"As part of our strategic plan to strengthen the mission of Anderson, a partnership with a larger health system provides a number of benefits for patients, physicians and employees," said John G. Anderson, president and CEO of Anderson Regional Health System. "The combination of these two faith-based systems supports a shared vision to enhance the delivery of clinical services. By joining Baptist Memorial, ARHS will be stronger and more equipped to meet the needs of our patients for many years to come."

After merging with Baptist Memorial, Anderson will maintain operations with local leadership, and patients will continue receiving advanced, high quality care, close to home.

# Cancer Center Receives Grants

Anderson Regional Cancer Center has been awarded two grants by the Community Foundation of East Mississippi to support its work in cancer prevention and treatment. The Rhonda Sheppard Hawkins Endowment will support cancer patients with special needs that

are not covered by insurance, such as transportation assistance, medicine assistance, and durable medical equipment. The Sandra Welch Niehuss Foundation for Cancer Prevention will fund education, prevention, and screening programs for local cancer patients. These programs include free cancer screenings for different types of cancers, as well as classes and quarterly "Lunch & Learn" sessions on various topics to improve community health. These grants are an essential part of the Center's comprehensive mission in the fight against cancer.

# Going Above and Beyond the Call of Duty



Caring physicians at Anderson are always aware there are real stories behind the people they treat, and Dr. Hatem Mourad is a shining example of how each patient is more than a diagnosis.

Recently, a young man came to Anderson with a diabetic crisis and was admitted to the ICU. He was stabilized, but he was frantic. He shared with Dr. Mourad that he left his 18-wheeler running on the side of the road in front of Love's Travel Stop in Toomsuba and that his two-year-old red Doberman, Shadow, was locked in the cab.

The young man further explained he was a first-generation Haitian immigrant who was in the United States alone and Shadow was his only family and only companion. What this young man did not know was that Dr. Mourad has always wanted a red Doberman. However, his wife was reluctant to get one because of the size of a Doberman.

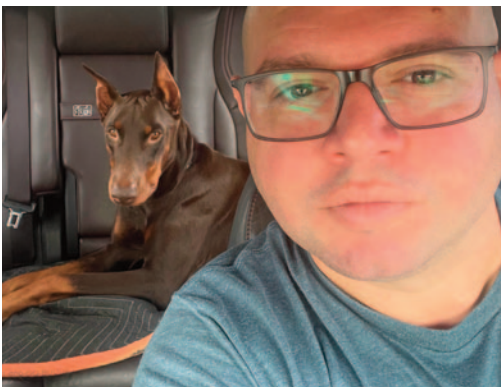
As an animal lover and caring physician,

Dr. Mourad sprang into action. He phoned his wife, Susie, shared the story and the two headed to Toomsuba. Both carefully climbed into the cabin to find "the friendliest red Doberman," he said.

Following instructions, the couple turned off the 18-wheeler and took Shadow into their home, where they showered him with lots of love, food, snacks and toys for several days.

Once the young man was strong enough to be discharged from the hospital, Dr. Mourad and Susie drove him to the pharmacy so he could fill his prescriptions, took him through the drive-thru of Raising Cane's for a meal then reunited him with his beloved dog, Shadow.

Dr. Mourad said he gave that young man the most detailed and thorough diabetes education of his career. And the "tail" end of the story? Susie now thinks having a red Doberman would be grand, and the couple are weeks away from welcoming a new puppy into their lives.

While I know this is part of her job, Jamie's demeanor stood out the most. She never made me feel that I was a bother by asking questions.

Another night, Jamie returned my call to tell me my husband was having a difficult night. Jamie said she would stay in his room until he went to sleep or was doing better. This was so special to me because I told her he disliked being alone. Knowing she remembered this made me so grateful to have chosen Anderson for my husband's care. Jamie was his favorite night nurse.

After we brought my husband home, Jamie continued to check up on him. When she heard that he had passed away, she reached out with condolences. Jamie is an asset to the ICU. She is very passionate about her job and the care of her patients. She administers to the sick and the family. Jamie is a perfect candidate for the Daisy Award."

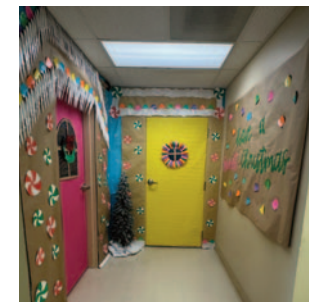
